Therefore, we are meeting with Medway Council to try to find possible solutions to put to the village to hopefully provide a permanent solution.

Milestone Birthdays

Quite a few of you know that I celebrated my 60th birthday last November. They even put it in the paper. Thank you all of you who joined in the celebrations. Thank you also for the greetings and presents I received and the donations to the church which people made to mark the occasion. These amounted to more than £600. Thank you indeed.

We make a lot of these milestone birthdays. You even see banners beside the road congratulating birthday boys and girls, though some are a bit worrying. "Happy 30th, Grandma," always gives pause for thought and arithmetic.

But birthdays seem to bring mixed feelings. There is a sense of celebration at getting so far, but also, perhaps, some anxiety about getting older and nearer to life's inevitable end. Children and young people tend to boast about their advancing years. Older people might try to conceal how old they are and may even pretend to be younger. You never, we are told, ask a lady her age. Very old people sometimes start boasting again about how old they are. "Have you lived here all your life?" the traveller asked the centenarian. "Not yet, young man," came the reply.

A young person getting older grows stronger and becomes more independent. Experience hopefully brings wisdom. On the other hand, physical fitness peaks around about thirty years of age and, as they say, there's no fool like an old fool.

Mixed feelings about age. When I was a student back in the 1970s, I had a trendsetter flatmate who used to accuse me of dressing like a middle aged country clergyman. Now I am a middle aged country clergyman, I tend to dress like a 1970s student. (I've still got some of the same clothes.) I feel flattered when people say I don't look my age, but I assume it is mere flattery, because I am never challenged to produce ID when I purchase age related products. Maybe shopkeepers and bar staff know that you have to be 23 to be ordained and the dog collar, therefore, is proof enough of age.

Young men used to try to look more mature by dressing like their dads. Now dads dress like teenagers. Fifty years ago, old people dressed to look their age, but those days are well gone. I'll keep silent on the subject of women's fashion – a subject beyond my comprehension.

You can understand teenagers exaggerating their age if they want to get into the pictures or to buy a drink and I suppose you can imagine why people on dating websites may knock a few years off – though I can't see much future in a relationship which starts off with a lie.

When you think about, it is odd either to boast about your age or to try to conceal it as if you were ashamed of how old you are. Age is just a measure of time. It's not something you can do anything about. I am sixty because I was born in 1954. That is neither to my credit nor to my shame.

All this makes me think of Psalm 90 – a psalm we sometimes use at funerals. The hymn *O God our Help in Ages Past* is based on it. Our lives are lived out in time, but we live our lives in time under the eternal providence of the eternal God. It is psalm 90 which says, *the days of our age are three score years and ten* (70 for those of you brought up on the new mathematics). Whatever happens to us in this life is in the Hands of God. We can pray to Him and trust Him. We can confess our sins to Him in the assurance of forgiveness. We should thank Him for all the blessings we receive. But, much more than this, not only can we trust God for our time bound life on earth – how ever short or long that may be; we can trust God for our eternity. It is all a matter of faithfulness – God's faithfulness to us and our faith in Him.

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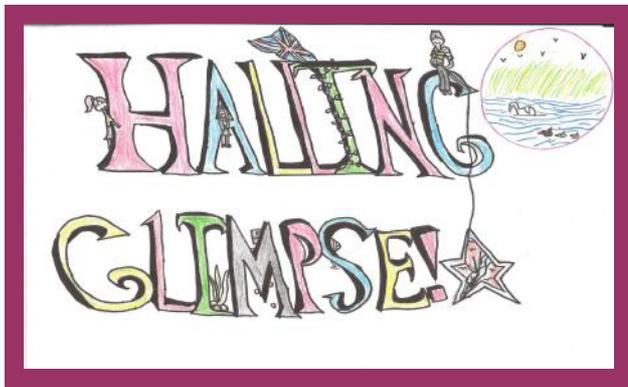

DEMOCRACY IN ACTION!

With the general election looming in May and the 800th anniversary of the signing of the Magna Carta in June, the time is ripe to learn about all things British.

In recent assemblies, the children have learnt about the Magna Carta and how this document was the basis of our nation's laws and democracy. We have looked at how the country is governed and how MPs are chosen to sit in Parliament. They have considered why the rule of law is important: what would our country, our community, our school be like without rules? They have considered the concept of tolerance: what does it mean to us and what are the things that we should not tolerate? In a lighter mode, the children have listened to music by the Beatles and learnt more about some of the famous characters and landmarks in British history.

So how does democracy work in school?

We have three houses in school: Gundolf, Scholey and Lambarde. Every September, all children in each house vote for two boys and two girls from Year 6 to be House Captains and Vice House Captains. These are much sought after positions and the contest begins with speeches from each candidate. Having been voted in, the House Captains take on a range of responsibilities throughout the year. They are expected to be role models for all pupils.

We also have a School Council. This comprises of two elected members from each class (from Year One onwards). Meetings are held regularly and chaired by two non-elected Year 6 pupils (Oliver Newby and Iona Rice) who have been chosen by teachers to hold this responsibility. Year 6 also has two elected members. I attend the School Council meetings and a range of issues is discussed. This can be anything from fund-raising ideas to our current issue: the school car park.

Our children, and a number of parents and members of staff, have expressed concerns about the way in which some of our parents use the school car park. Issues raised by the children include: driving too fast; double parking; parking on the zebra crossings. Solutions initially suggested by the children included: issuing parking tickets; wheel clamping; naming and shaming - they certainly express strong views on how things should be done! As a result, our PTA (The Friends of Halling School) funded some banners for the car park to remind everyone of how we expect drivers to behave in the car park. These were designed by the School Council. They have also met with Medway's Safer Journeys Team who made some suggestions regarding encouraging more people to walk to school – if you don't already do so, please give it some serious consideration!

Our children are also asked to complete questionnaires or interviews regularly so that we can find out what they think about their school. Recently, they have been asked their views on the new curriculum, completed a general questionnaire about school and another about PE. Year 6 are working with the Kent Community Rail Partnership re plans to develop local stations and there are plans for future consultation with the school about the improvement of the recreation grounds in the village.

Ask any of our children: "Who are the most important people in this school?" and the great majority will reply: "We are!"

HALLING'S MARSHES AND FOOTPATHS

In December, I wrote about footpaths and walks leading away from Halling, with the lure of pubs at journeys' ends. One easy walk of less than two hours, even at the slowest pace, reaches the *White Hart* in Cuxton. Much preferable to the dreary main road walk back home is the half-hourly train service from nearby Cuxton Station to Halling.

Start in Cemetery Road from Halling High Street, cross the bridge over the by-pass, and press on along the Cam Path (RS222) in the general direction of the hills until Vicarage Road is reached. Follow the road up to its junction with The Street and Pilgrims Road. Go up the short road ahead, and bear left of Court Farm – still in the direction of the hills – and walk past a metal barrier. Turn *right* where the path splits. A lengthy but not difficult pull uphill brings you to a 'cross-road' of paths. You have reached the *North Downs Way* which connects Farnham in Surrey with Canterbury and Dover, some 131 miles of walking. However, turn right (in a northerly direction), and walk on and on unswervingly – ignoring *all* signs that offer left or right turns – until a metal gate sided by a 'kissing gate' is reached. Follow the path down to St Michael & All Angels Church in Cuxton, through the churchyard, and down the short hill on the A228 that leads to the *White Hart*.

As I write this, the footpaths are as wet and muddy as Halling's marsh footpaths. Even in better weather, boots or stout shoes should be the preferred footwear. Frankly, it is a more enjoyable walk in drier and warmer weather when the chalk shows through a brilliant white. There will be avenues of deciduous trees in leaf, and then open fields with very different views of the Medway Valley. At the right times, there will be the smell of wild garlic (*ramsons*) and the glory of bluebells spread across the woodland floor.

Squirrels are everywhere: lucky walkers might see weasels scurry across the path.

Nearer home, the welcome news is that a side-gate has been fitted by the Maximillian Road entrance to the marsh footpath round the river. This enables walkers to avoid much of the mud (the bane of *all* rural footpaths), and pick their ways across that part of the marsh round the pylon. Easily avoided are the water obstacles of natural and necessary drainage channels and man-made and (in my opinion) unnecessary 'duck scrapes'. Halling Common should be a place for people to roam more readily. To make that easier, there are plans to cut back thickets of decades to open a new footpath from the side-gate along high ground to meet the stile in Marsh Road just beyond the marsh gate.

Permissions are being sought left, right and centre for a legal 'permissive path' to link the bottom of the Plough Path with Whittings Farm – which will save walkers, especially those from Upper Halling going in the Snodland direction, having to cross an increasingly dangerous by-pass.

I hold less hope for a footpath link across Cemex ground to link marsh footpaths with Formby Terrace because of the undeniable danger to walkers being too near heavy lorries using the very narrow road-tunnel under the railway line.

Lastly, Mary Acott (a former Halling Parish Council Clerk) and Colin (why don't I know more people's surnames after 40 years?) have gently corrected me about the 'tick' 'tick' 'tick' of the Ticker Path: the 'ticking' came not from pumped water but from an engine used in the excavation process of former 'cement days'.
